Although we've had to cancel several of our Vietnam Medal Ceremonies over the past few months due to COVID-19 and may have to do so again, we're still accepting applications from any current Long Island Vietnam veterans who wish to receive a Vietnam 50th Anniversary Commemorative Medal at one of our upcoming ceremonies. To date we have held 32 Vietnam 50th Anniversary Commemorative Medal Ceremonies and have presented medals to almost 1,000 veterans.

The requirements are:

- Served in the Vietnam theater of operations in any branch of the military as per DD Form 214
- Currently living in Nassau, Suffolk, Brooklyn, Queens or Staten Island
- Can attend the ceremony (medals are presented only at the ceremony; they are not mailed)

You will find a medal application at the end of this newsletter. Please feel free to use it to apply for a medal yourself, or to give it to a qualified friend or family member who would be interested in applying. You can also download an application from our website at LIAFA.org.

Snacks and light refreshments are served at all meetings. They also provide services to student veterans at numerous Long Island college campuses and monthly community outreach in Sachem, Huntington Station, and Patchague. Public defense attorneys are rarely trained to adequately represent veterans who suffer from the invisible wounds of war or to translate the combat experience of their clients to explain resulting criminal behavior. This program provides training, support and legal assistance to promote trauma-informed effective representation of veterans and service members. The Veteran Defense Program (VDP) is a project of the New York State Defenders Association (NYSDA), a statewide nonprofit organization working to improve the quality and scope of publicly-supported legal representation for people who cannot afford a lawyer. # Convair B-58 Hustler

If you've ever seen the 1964 Cold War thriller Fail Safe, then you've seen the B-58, the first operational bomber capable of Mach 2 flight. Developed during the 1950s to replace the Boeing B-47 Stratojet in the strategic bomber role, the B-58 entered service with SAC (Strategic Air Command) in March 1960. Its design was unusual-looking for a bomber of the period, based as it was around a large delta wing with four General Electric J79-GE-1 turbojet engines carried in underwing pods. There was no bomb bay; the first models carried a single nuclear weapon plus fuel in a large pod underneath the fuselage. On later models, four external hardpoints were added to carry an additional four bombs.

The plane took a crew of three including the pilot, bombardier/navigator and defensive systems operator with each seated in separated tandem cockpits. Later versions of the B-58 came equipped with a novel ejection capsule that could eject at 70,000 feet at speeds up to Mach 2; a protective clamshell would totally enclose the seat and it was even buoyant so it could serve as a lifeboat. The only defensive weapon was a single tail-mounted radar-aimed 20 mm cannon with 1200 rounds of ammunition. The B-58 was also one of the first planes to incorporate aluminum honeycomb panels in its construction.

It was originally conceived as a high-speed, high-altitude bomber designed to avoid Soviet interceptors. When the later introduction by the Soviets of high-altitude surface-to-air missiles made this mission extremely perilous, the B-58's role was changed to achieve low-level-penetration, which severely limited its range (which was not great to begin with) and its speed. The performance of the B-58 was exceptional, but it was a difficult plane to fly, largely due to the large delta wing as well as a tendency for the fuel in the pod to move around during flight and suddenly change the aircraft's center of gravity. In addition, it was a complex aircraft that required considerable maintenance with specialized equipment and was also expensive to operate. The B-58 also had a high accident rate26 of them were lost in accidents, 22.4% of total production. General Curtis LeMay was never satisfied with the bomber and after having flown in one, declared that it was too small, too expensive to maintain and required an excessive number of aerial refuelings to complete a mission. In 1965, Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara ordered that the B-58 be retired by 1970 due mainly to the high sustainment cost for the fleet. The B-58 was retired by January 1970 and was replaced by the General Dynamics F-111 Aardvark, which had entered service in 1967 and was able to perform the low-level mission less expensively and with the added flexibility of being able to deploy with conventional weapons.

During its rather short ten-year service life, the B-58 set 19 world speed records, including the longest supersonic flight in history in 1963 when it flew 8,028 miles from Tokyo to London (via Alaska) with five aerial refuelings in 8 hours, 35 minutes and 20.4 seconds, averaging 938 MPH. The name of the plane was Greased Lightening. Since B-58 pilots were the only USAF pilots experienced in long-duration supersonic flight, several former Hustler crew members were selected to fly the Lockheed SR-71 Blackbird at the start of that program.

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# Did you know . . .

John Denver's father, LtCol Henry J. Deutschendorf, Sr., held several speed records as a B-58 pilot.

The Pentagon, unlike many other distinguished buildings, contains no marble. Italy is the world's main source of marble. Since the Pentagon was built during World War II and Italy was then one of the Axis powers, the USA had no access to this raw material.

The US Army is actually older than the USA itself. Prior to the Declaration of Independence and the ensuing conflict with Great Britain, the Massachusetts Provincial Congress called for an organized colonial army of 26 regiments. This authorization would be further ratified by the Second Continental Congress on June 14, 1775, which is celebrated as the birthdate of the US armed forces.

Ray-Ban sunglasses originated with a request to Bausch & Lomb in 1929 by US Army Air Corps Colonel John Macready to create aviation sunglasses that would reduce glare and fogging-up, which was a problem with the goggles then being used by pilots. The prototype was created in 1936 and further refined with impact-resistant lenses and metal frames. The end result was the Ray-Ban Aviator, which was patented in 1939.

# **Taps**

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George W. Biggs, a member of the famed Tuskegee Airmen, died at a senior care facility in Tucson, AZ on September 19 at age 95; no cause of death was given. He enlisted in 1943 at the age of 18 and was trained as a navigator. He also flew B-47 and B-52 bombers in the Korean and Vietnam wars while earning numerous military honors.

**Vincent P. Greco**, World War II Army veteran and member of Freeport American Legion William Clinton Story Post 342, died on July 20 at the age of 95.

Winston Groom, author of the novel Forrest Gump, died at his home in Fairhope, AL of a suspected heart attack on September 17 at the age of 77. Groom had served with the Army's Fourth Infantry Division from 1965 to 1969, which included a tour in Vietnam, one of the settings for the novel. The book spawned a 1994 movie of the same name starring Tom Hanks, Sally Field and Gary Sinise, which earned him widespread fame.

Cecil "Steve" Stibbens, Marine gunnery sergeant who was the first Stars and Stripes reporter sent to cover the Vietnam War, died in Dallas, TX on September 19 at age 84. Stibbens was awarded a Bronze Star with "V" device for his work with Stars and Stripes and was named Military Photographer of the Year for both 1963 and 1964.
