23 Vietnam veterans were presented with Vietnam 50th Anniversary Commemorative Medals and Certificates of Appreciation during LIAFA's 27th Vietnam medal ceremony on March 23 at the Long Island State Veterans Home in Stony Brook (26 veterans were scheduled but 3 could not make it to the ceremony). This particular venue is always special since many of the home's residents show up for the event and their presence makes the event especially poignant. Distinguished guests included Congressman Lee Zeldin, 106th Rescue Wing Aircraft Maintenance Commander LTC Jesse Fritz, Veterans Home Executive Director Fred Sganga, Veterans Home Deputy Executive Director Jonathan Spier and Veterans Home Chaplain Rev. Gregory Leonard. 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FDNY Honors Fallen Long Island Airman

Air National Guard Master Sergeant Christopher Raguso, who was killed on March 15, 2018 along with six other men when their helicopter crashed in Iraq near the Syrian border, was honored on March 30 with a plaque that was unveiled during a dedication ceremony at Ladder Company 155 in Jamaica, Queens, where he was most recently assigned. MSgt Raguso was one of four members of the 106th Rescue Wing who were killed in the crash. He was a lieutenant with the FDNY as well as a volunteer member of the Commack Fire Department.

Hear the history of the women who flew military aircraft on the home front to free up men for military combat or other duties. They flew over 60 million miles, transported every type of military aircraft, towed targets for live anti-aircraft gun practice, simulated strafing missions and transported cargo. 38 WASP members lost their lives and one disappeared while on a ferry mission, her fate still unknown as of 2018. In 1977, for their World War II service, the members were granted veteran status and in 2009 awarded the Congressional Gold Medal.

Veterans Defense Program

Justice-involved veterans often do not have the funds to hire an attorney and are represented by public defenders. Public defense attorneys are rarely trained to adequately represent veterans who suffer from the invisible wounds of war or to translate the combat experience of their clients to explain resulting criminal behavior. This program provides training, support and legal assistance to promote trauma-informed effective representation of veterans and service members. The Veteran Defense

Program (VDP) is a project of the New York State Defenders Association (NYSDA), a statewide nonprofit organization working to improve the quality and scope of publicly-supported legal representation for people who cannot a lawyer. Walk With Frank

Frank Romeo, who celebrated his 70th birthday on March 1, is a Vietnam veteran from Bay Shore who in 1969 served with the 199th Light Infantry Brigade, an air-mobile unit designed for covert warfare. He is a recipient of the Purple Heart and was diagnosed with a 100% post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) disability.

For the past 30 years, Frank has traveled the country teaching and advocating for PTSD awareness to young people in school through his award-winning program *The Art of War*. He feels his message of education before military service will help build a strong country and help our veterans when they return to deal with today's social issues.

In 2014 he returned to Southeast Asia for 7 weeks, living in grass huts and visiting bombed-out areas in order to recreate the wartime experience. While traveling through the countryside and dining with his former enemies, he learned about their post-war trauma and how they dealt with it. Each day he posted a daily blog about his thoughts and feelings. When it was feasible, he would even Skype into classrooms as students posed questions in real time. Channel 12 NY aired a few of these lessons.

Walk With Frank: In order to bring greater awareness about PTSD to the public, Frank is now literally walking 750 miles across New York State, having started off in Buffalo on March 1. His plan is to finish up his trek in Bay Shore by June 1. Frank will be living in homeless shelters, eating in soup kitchens and visiting organizations frequented by veterans. The Documentary: Giving Voice to the Voiceless

In his thirty years of advocating for PTSD awareness, Romeo sees a disconnect between the younger generation's understanding of the idea of war and the actual reality of war. Romeo believes that more education concerning the realities of war and PTSD are essential to understanding and confronting veterans' issues. "Walk With Frank" will tell the story of Frank Romeo's 50-year journey, which began in 1968 when he enlisted in the US Army to fight in the Vietnam War. By documenting Romeo's conversations with homeless veterans, the film will provide insight into PTSD and its impact on society. The film will also honor the veteran by giving him/her a voice. The film seeks to increase public awareness of the impact of PTSD on veterans, their families, and society.

Did you know . . .

Pennies are not accepted at overseas military exchanges or other shops on base since they are too heavy and are not cost-effective for the government to ship to and from the USA.

In World War II, supporting one soldier on the battlefield took one gallon of fuel per day. Today, more than 22 gallons of fuel per soldier/day is needed.

After the release of the movie “Top Gun” in 1986, the US Navy stated that the number of young men who wanted to become naval aviators went up by 500 percent.

The U.S.S. John Stennis nuclear-powered aircraft carrier has a more powerful air force than 70% of all countries.

The original shoulder patch from 1924 for the 45th Infantry Division contained a swastika up until 1939, when it was replaced by a thunderbird, for obvious reasons. Both design choices were chosen because of the large population of Native Americans in the southwestern United States (both were common Native American symbols).

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Open Season for Teacher of the Year

Eligible applicants for our \$1,000.00 Scholastic Grant program are high school seniors going on to college. Applicants must have a military connection to apply. Examples include: a dependent of an active-duty military member, ANG/NG member or other reserve component member. Students with relatives who are veterans are also eligible. Taps



Colonel Joe M. Jackson died January 12 at the age of 95. He had enlisted in the Army Air Corps in 1941 shortly before turning 18 and served as a gunnery instructor during World War II. He later flew 107 combat missions as an F-84 Thunderjet pilot in Korea, where he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross as well as the Air Force Medal with 3 Oak Leaf Clusters. In 1956 he became one of the first Air Force U-2 pilots. However, it was in Vietnam that he earned his highest honor. On May 12, 1968 then-Lt. Col. Jackson, serving as a C-123 pilot with the 311th Air Commando Squadron, was called in to rescue a three-man combat control team trapped under heavy enemy fire at a special forces camp in Kham Duc. The camp had been surrounded by enemy forces for weeks and an evacuation of the roughly 1,000 U.S. troops and allied civilians had been ordered. In the confusion, the three-man team had been left behind. North Vietnamese and Viet Cong fighters were raking the camp with small arms, mortars, automatic weapons and recoilless rifle fire while ammo dumps were blowing up and littering the runway with debris. Eight rescue aircraft went in on the morning of May 12. All were taken out by hostile enemy fire.

Jackson started his approach to the camp runway from 9,000 feet and went into an extremely steep dive at maximum speed and rate of descent. After he touched down amidst the chaos, he saw the three men running toward his plane. At that moment, his co-pilot called out that a 122-mm rocket had been fired at their aircraft. Fortunately, it broke in half and skidded to a stop right by the plane's nose without exploding. The three men boarded the plane and then, despite all the enemy fire that was directed at them, the C-123 managed to lift off successfully and make it back to safety. Amazingly, they later discovered that not a single round had pierced the airframe.

For his actions at Kham Duc that day, Jackson was presented with the Medal of Honor by President Lyndon B. Johnson during a White House ceremony on Jan. 16, 1969. He also received his second Distinguished Flying Cross and three additional Oak Leaf Clusters to the Air Medal.
