Nassau County Firefighters Operation Wounded Warrior (NCFF-OWW)

A nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization **not** affiliated with the Wounded Warrior Project or any other Operation Wounded Warrior organization, the NCFF-OWW is committed to helping those who put their lives in harm's way to protect the rights granted to us, the citizens of the United States of America. Their mission is to boost the morale of service members wounded in the line of duty. The NCFF-OWW works closely with military representatives of the Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in Washington DC, Womack Army Medical Center in Fort Bragg, NC and the Naval Hospital in Camp Lejeune, NC. Together, they ensure that useful clothing, personal entertainment electronics, and get-well cards are properly channeled to recovering service personnel. Donations are brought down to Bethesda Naval Hospital and other Wounded Warrior centers via Fire Truck Caravan. Firefighters from throughout the Greater New York area join their 'parade' from New York to military hospitals in the south. Volunteers are also welcome to join their ranks, even if you are not a firefighter! The NCFF-OWW is comprised of firefighter and EMS volunteers throughout Nassau County who conduct numerous fundraising events throughout the year to help meet their goal of providing material and moral support to the wounded men and women of our Armed Forces. Each year's efforts culminate with a personal visit of NCFF-OWW representatives to each of the military hospitals in the area to meet with our brave wounded warriors and express their gratitude for the sacrifices that they have endured for our country. In addition to collecting items and visiting our wounded service personnel, the NCFF-OWW organizes, on behalf of the Nassau County fire service, welcome-home receptions for local service members who have recovered from serious injuries. If you're looking to donate clothing, books, small appliances or pretty much anything else, and also want to help veterans, go to <u>clothingdonations.org</u> or call (631) 582-0242 to schedule a pick-up. Please put the donation outside before 7 AM on the scheduled pick-up date, clearly marked *Vietnam Veterans of America*, so that the driver can see it from the street. VVA has found that the most profitable way to sell household discards is through bulk-purchase agreements with private retailers on a bid basis. A portion of the proceeds goes to our local Nassau County VVA Chapter 82.

Nassau County Veterans Support Grant Program

New Suicide and Crisis Hotline Phone Number

Effective July 16, 2022, 988 is the new Suicide and Crisis Lifeline number, which offers 24/7 call, text and chat access to trained crisis counselors who can help people experiencing suicidal, substance use, and/or mental health crisis issues, or any other kind of emotional distress. People can also dial 988 if they are worried about a loved one who may need crisis support. Veterans can use this new option by dialing 988 and then pressing 1 to contact the Veterans Crisis Line.

Veteran Functions at Eisenhower Park

All veterans organizations that wish to hold an event, ceremony or other function at the park must contact the Nassau County Veterans Service Agency to get a permit. This requirement protects the organization as well as the park since the NCVSA holds an insurance policy covering any accidents or injuries that may occur during such events. Veterans Traffic Court (Nassau County)

The Nassau County Traffic and Parking Violations Agency (NCTPVA) holds monthly traffic court sessions (on the third Thursday afternoon of each month) dedicated to assisting veterans and activeduty military members with resolving violations. NCTPVA will work with the District Court to bundle all traffic violations together. This program is a one-time-only opportunity so don't waste it on minor violations. Veterans Treatment Court (Nassau County)

U.S. military veterans charged with minor nonviolent offenses may qualify for reduced charges or penalties by participating in a court-supervised treatment program. To apply, a pre-screening questionnaire must be completed and forwarded to the district attorney's office. You must then contact the Veterans Treatment Court Project Director to set a clinical evaluation for the purpose of determining treatment needs. If you are found to be eligible, you will be contacted by the D.A.'s office offer proposed. id you know . . .

Mitchel Field in Uniondale was NOT named after Brigadier General Billy Mitchell, the pioneering advocate for American military airpower, who is widely considered to be the father of the U.S. Air **Force.** The tip-off is in the spelling—Billy Mitchell's last name ends with

two I's while the name of the airfield contains just a single I at the end.

The site where Mitchel Field now stands has been used as a military post since Revolutionary War days, when it was an Army enlistment center. It was converted into an airfield in 1909 due to its flat, treeless, hard clay surface and had several names before finally being christened Mitchel Field in 1918 in honor of John Purroy Mitchel (interestingly, his last name is spelled incorrectly in the photo below).

So, who is this Mitchel with the single l? Born July 19, 1879, in the Bronx, he was trained as a lawyer and in 1907 he was hired by the New York City Corporation Counsel to investigate potential corruption in the office of Manhattan Borough President John F. Ahearn. That investigation led to Ahearn being found guilty of nepotism on a large scale and he was dismissed from his position by the governor. Mitchel went on to investigate the borough presidents of the Bronx, Queens, and Brooklyn. They were all found guilty on corruption charges and were removed from office just as Ahearn had been. In 1913 Mitchel, now with a firm reputation as an effective reformer, ran for mayor on the Republican ticket against Edward E. McCall, the candidate of the powerful and corrupt Tammany Hall Democratic political machine. Mitchel won by 121,000 votes, making him the second-youngest mayor in New York City history at age 34 and earning him the moniker "Boy Mayor of New York." Although he did an excellent job of clearing up corruption, especially in the New York City Police Department, and was initially quite popular, Mitchel's star began to fade due to his fiscal policies, his controversial education reforms, and his support for universal military training—a draft. He went on to lose the Republican primary in 1917 but ran anyway as a pro-war fusion candidate with a media campaign that emphasized patriotism and denounced Germans, Jews, and his fellow Irish as enemy sympathizers. He lost.

Almost immediately after his loss, Mitchel enlisted in the Air Service (as the Air Force was then called), completed pilot training and attained the rank of major. On the morning of July 6, 1918, while flying back from a training exercise to Gerstner Field in Louisiana, Mitchel's plane suddenly went into a nosedive, causing him to fall from his plane due to an unfastened seatbelt. The 500-foot fall led to his death. His body was returned to New York City, where 10,000 people thronged the streets and twenty aircraft showered the mourners with flowers as they marched along Fifth Avenue on the way to his Requiem Mass and funeral at St. Patrick's Cathedral. Among his pallbearers was Theodore Roosevelt, who said of Mitchel, "In all our country, there was no finer American and no more upright and able public servant." He was buried at Woodlawn Cemetery in the Bronx.

American Airpower Museum



Any of you who have attended our annual Pearl Harbor memorial ceremony or some of our Vietnam veteran medal ceremonies are certainly familiar with this venerable aviation museum located at Republic Airport on 1230 New Highway in Farmingdale. The museum is housed in one of the few remaining Republic Aviation hangars built in 1940 to support wartime production of the little-known P-43 Lancer fighter and the renowned P-47 Thunderbolt fighter-bomber during World War II. After World War II, Republic Aviation would go on to produce jet aircraft; Republic was acquired by Fairchild in 1965 and became a division of Fairchild, which itself went through several acquisitions until becoming defunct in 2003.

The museum was founded in 2000 by Jeff Clyman and his family, with the help of then-governor of New York, George Pataki, which brought aviation history to life to honor our veterans, local aviation pioneers, the men and women who built and flew the aircraft and the legacy of New York's part in the Arsenal of Democracy through the twentieth century and up to today.

From the museum's website, its mission: The mission of the American Airpower Museum is the preservation of aviation and military history, to educate the public and the next generation of Americans about the courage, valor, sacrifice, and heroism of our nation's veterans, aviation pioneers, and aviation industry workers of the arsenal of democracy. We accomplish this mission by preserving, displaying, and flying operational and static examples of our nation's legendary airpower and ground vehicles in our collection as well as through our related displays, exhibits and event programs. We strive to create an experience at our museum that will educate and inspire future generations in the subjects of aviation, engineering, math, science, and history.

At the museum, you will find flying aircraft such as the North American P-51D Mustang fighter, North American B-25 Mitchell bomber, Curtiss P-40M Warhawk fighter, North American AT-6D Texan

trainer aircraft, Douglas C-47B Skytrain transport aircraft and Grumman TBM-3E Avenger torpedo bomber, among others; static aircraft such as the Republic F-84E Thunderjet fighter, Republic F-105D Thunderchief fighter-bomber, Fairchild Republic A-10 Thunderbolt II (AKA Warthog) close air support aircraft and General Dynamics F-111A Aardvark strike, recon and electronic countermeasures aircraft; and exhibits such as the Doolittle Tokyo Raiders Tribute, D-Day Airborne Display, Tuskegee Airmen, War Correspondents, and the Vietnam War. The museum is also currently restoring a Consolidated PBY-6A Catalina flying boat. PBYs were used extensively during World War II in anti-submarine warfare, patrol bombing, convoy escort, search-and-rescue, and cargo transport, and were built in greater numbers than any other flying boat. They served with every branch of the United States Armed Forces, and in the air forces and navies of many other nations.

The museum is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization and is not subsidized by state or local government; it relies heavily on admission fees, membership fees, private donations, and corporate sponsorships to keep the facility in operation, and to maintain the flying and static aircraft on public display. The museum is open Wednesday-Sunday, 10:30 AM-4 PM. Taps

John Baptisto Fiore of Glen Cove passed away on December 31 at the age of 73 after complications from hernia surgery. An Army veteran, John was in the 1st Cavalry Division (Company A. 2nd Battalion, 5th Cavalry) in Vietnam in 1969 serving as a Light Weapons Infantryman. He participated in forty-five helicopter combat missions, earning him an Air Medal, Army Commendation Medal, Combat Infantry Badge, Vietnam Service Medal, Vietnam Combat Medal, and the National Defense Medal. He was the commander of VFW Post 1819 in Port Washington and American Legion Post 422 in Whitestone. John made sure that no "unclaimed veteran" was ever buried with nobody in attendance. At their funerals, he would recite the poem, "Bury Me with Soldiers," and then accept the flag because he treated veterans as family. John is survived by his son John and his two sisters, Grace Cafaro of Ridge Pike, PA and Ann Meredeth of Waverly, TN.
