This event was held on **Sunday, October 19**, at the 13-acre farm in Islandia owned by Pal-O-Mine Equestrian, a nonprofit organization that uses horses to facilitate growth, learning and healing for children and adults with disabilities, veterans and others. A \$10,000 grant from the Marilyn Lichtman Foundation supported VetFest 2025 and will also help fund Pal-O-Mine's many programs for veterans and their families throughout the year.

Pal-O-Mine hosted 40 veterans' resource groups, covering issues such as housing, employment, education, equine therapy and much more. Warrior Help a Hero Showdown

The games were: Long Island Warriors vs. FDNY at 6:45 PM; Long Island Warriors vs. NJ Warriors 8:30 PM on **Saturday, November 15**, at the Northwell Health Ice Center at Eisenhower Park in East Meadow. All proceeds benefited the Matthews family. Jay Matthews is a married 35-year-old Long Island native who is an active Army Reserve member, a Selden volunteer firefighter and an FDNY firefighter. Jay's and his wife Brittney's young son, Jack, born mid-2023, was diagnosed with a rare and aggressive form of cancer (BCOR Sarcoma) at eighteen months old; he passed away this past August. The family has incurred significant medical, home improvement and other bills caring for Jack and childcare for his older sister, McKenna.

Veterans Annual Winter Stand Down

The annual Nassau County Winter Stand Down, hosted by Nassau County Executive Bruce Blakeman and the Nassau County Veterans Service Agency, took place on **Tuesday, November 25**, from 9 AM to 1 PM at the Freeport Armory; the stand down is always held on the Tuesday before Thanksgiving. Volunteers came on the Monday morning before the event to help pack the items into bags to be distributed at the stand down. It was a drive-through-only event; items distributed included over 500 turkeys with fixings, canned vegetables, mashed potato mix, clothes, boots, toiletries, gift cards and nonperishable foods; all items were brand new. Roughly 600 veterans, the highest turnout in many years, came to the event and received a bag of goodies and information on resources available to help them throughout the year.

Among the volunteers at the stand down were Nassau County Executive **Bruce Blakeman**, Nassau County Veterans Service Agency Director **Ralph Esposito**, Nassau County Comptroller **Elaine Phillips**, State Senator **Steve Rhoads**, and Nassau County Legislator **Samantha A. 84th Pearl Harbor Memorial Ceremony (Dropping of the Roses)

The ceremony was held at the American Airpower Museum in Farmingdale on **Sunday, December 7**. Special recognition was given to five World War II veterans in the form of proclamations presented by Nassau County Veterans Service Agency Director **Ralph Esposito**, Suffolk County Veterans Service Agency Deputy Director Col. (Ret.) **Jim Brennan** and Chaplain **Robert Robesch**.

Other distinguished guests included Suffolk County Executive **Ed Romaine**, 106th Rescue Wing (ANG) Director of Compliance & Resolution **LTC Peter Papandrea**, Commander of the Navy Reserve Center of Long Island **CDR Heidi Antonucci**, American Airpower Museum Director **Larry Starr**, Deputy Executive Director of the Long Island State Veterans Home **Jonathan Spier**, President and Cofounder of Mission Margraten Plus **Roger Kilfoil**, Vice President and Cofounder of Mission Margraten Plus **Stephanie Folwell**, Paws of War veteran advocate **Ray Meyer**, Skytypers Air Show Team Pilot **Tom Daly** and veteran caseworker for Congressman Tom Suozzi **Ed Aulman**.

Five World War II vets attended the ceremony. They were:

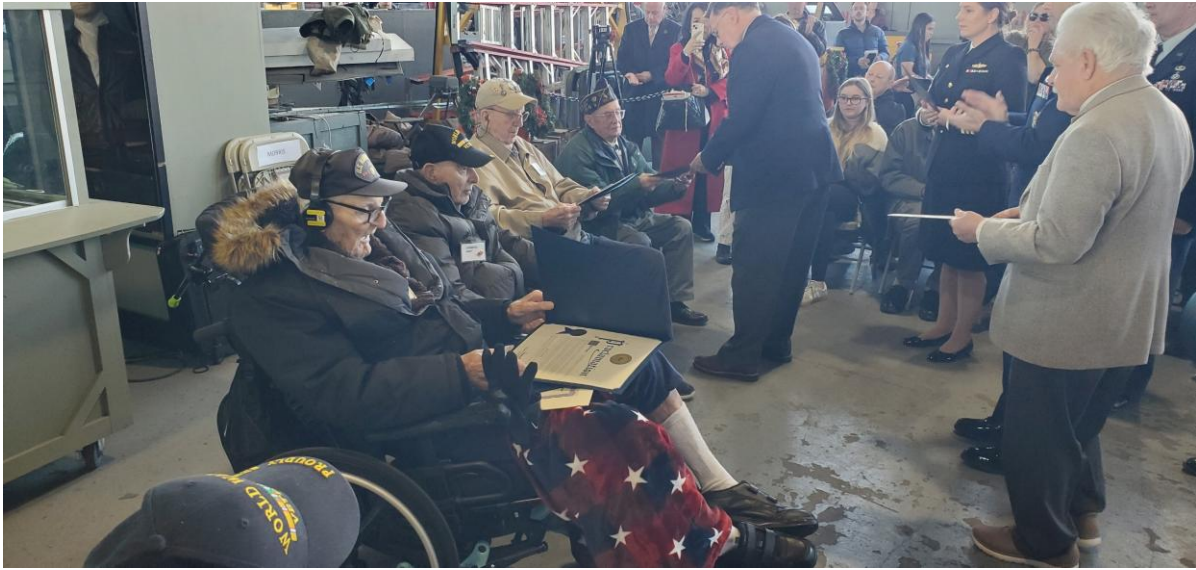
- SSG Dominick Critelli—U.S. Army, Battle of the Bulge, age 104
- CPL Cliff Doering—U.S. Marine Corps, Battle of Okinawa, age 100 (now deceased—see “Taps”)
- Tech 4 Harold Levenberg—U.S. Army, European Theater, age 100 (now deceased—see “Taps”)
- SSG Tom Morris—U.S. Army Air Corps, Pacific Theater, age 101
- Tech 5 David Palmer—U.S. Army, European Theater, age 100

After the roses were blessed, the colors were retired, and the indoor ceremony ended, eighty-five roses (eighty-four red roses and one white rose for 9/11) were presented to the crew of the Skytypers Air Show Team’s SNJ-2 *Texan* aircraft, who then took off to drop the roses over the Statue of Liberty at 12:55 PM to mark the exact New York time of the Pearl Harbor attack.

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Announcements and Programs

New York Bill Providing Property Tax Exemption for Veterans with 100% Service-Connected Disability Signed into Law

New York Senate Bill S-1183 was signed into law by Governor Hochul on December 19, 2025. **NOTE:** the exemption is **NOT** automatic; local governments (counties, cities, towns, villages, or school districts) must adopt a law to implement this exemption. If adopted, the law allows for a full exemption from property taxes on the veteran's primary residence. Veterans must have been discharged under honorable conditions and rated as 100% disabled by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.

Changes to How Disabled Veterans Can Get VA Automobile Grants

Qualified disabled veterans who have previously received a Department of Veterans Affairs automobile grant to purchase a specially equipped vehicle 30 or more years ago may now be eligible to apply for another one.

The Advancing Uniform Transportation Opportunities for Veterans Act, known as the AUTO Act (signed into law in January 2023), allows veterans with qualifying service-connected disabilities to receive an automobile grant from the Department of Veterans Affairs every 10 years instead of just once in their lifetimes. Under the new law, veterans who haven't received a vehicle grant in 30 years are immediately eligible to apply for another one; and they can then apply for a new grant every 10 years.

Eligibility requirements haven't changed. Veterans and active-duty service members qualify for the automobile grant if they have a service-connected disability that includes at least one of these conditions:

- Loss, or permanent loss of use, of one or both feet
- Loss, or permanent loss of use, of one or both hands
- Permanent decreased vision in both eyes, meaning 20/200 vision or less in the better eye with glasses; or greater than 20/200 vision but with a visual field defect that reduces peripheral vision to 20 degrees or less in the better eye
- Severe burn injuries
- Amyotrophic lateral sclerosis
- Ankylosis in one or both knees or hips (this qualifies for adaptive equipment grants only, not the automobile purchase grant)

The disability must be service-connected or treated as service-connected under 38 U.S.C. 1151, which covers disabilities resulting from VA medical care.

The AUTO Act also updated how VA classifies certain vehicle modifications. The law allows VA to pay for specific modifications as medical services rather than only through the adaptive equipment program. These modifications include van lifts, raised doors, raised roofs, air conditioning and wheelchair tie-downs for passenger use. This change matters because it provides another pathway for veterans to obtain necessary vehicle modifications through VA health care rather than solely through the benefits system.

2026 COLA for Military Retirees and SBP Annuitants

Based on the increase in the Consumer Price Index, there is a 2.8 percent Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) for most retired pay and Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) annuities effective December 1, 2025. Retirees will see the change in their December 31, 2025, payment and SBP annuitants in their January 2, 2026, payment.

VA Home Improvements and Structural Alterations (HISA) Grants

The VA Home Improvements and Structural Alterations Benefit (HISA) provides financial assistance to disabled veterans with service-connected medical conditions (and sometimes non-service-connected conditions) who require modifications to their homes, whether owned or rented by the veteran.

This benefit provides medically necessary improvements and structural alterations to Veterans/Servicemembers' primary residence for the following purposes:

- Allowing entrance to or exit from the primary residence
- Use of essential lavatory and sanitary facilities (e.g. roll-in showers)
- Allowing accessibility to kitchen or bathroom sinks or counters (e.g., lowering counters/sinks)

- Improving entrance paths or driveways in immediate area of the home to facilitate access to the home through construction of permanent ramping
- Improving plumbing or electrical systems made necessary due to installation of home medical equipment

You may use HISA benefits to pay for more than one home alteration, until you exhaust your lifetime benefit. HISA benefits approved by VA for use in a particular home alteration but unused by you will remain available for future use.

\$6800 lifetime limitation:

- A service-connected condition
- A non-service-connected condition of a veteran rated 50% or more service-connected.
- A non-service-connected condition of a veteran in receipt of benefits under Title 38, USC Section 1151 for the condition requiring such benefit.

\$2000 lifetime limitation:

- All other veterans receiving medical services furnished under Title 38, USC Sections 1710(a)(2) and (3).

***** IMPORTANT***:** Do not start a modification until you receive an approval letter from Prosthetic & Sensory Aids Service (PSAS).

Nassau County DD Form 214 Recording and Veterans Discount Photo ID Card

County Clerk Maureen O'Connell offers a Veterans Recognition Program, allowing veterans the opportunity to record their veteran discharge papers (DD Form 214) free of charge with the Nassau County Clerk's Office. Upon recording these documents, the veteran will be eligible to receive a Veterans Discount Photo ID Card, which provides discounts at participating businesses throughout Nassau County.

Be on the Alert for Veteran Charity Scams

Making a donation to a veterans charity might seem like a great idea, but if it's a charity that you've never heard of or one that has solicited you in person or by telephone, mail or email, it's worth taking a few minutes to check it out before writing that check, reaching for your wallet or submitting your credit card information. Phony charities claiming to support police, firefighters, veterans or sick children are not uncommon, so it makes sense to do some research before handing over your money. Websites like Charity Navigator and Charity Watch provide information about many charities, including data on their fundraising practices, and often highlight suspect charities. The sites are free and may save you from enriching scammers and depriving legitimate charities of needed donations.

Navy Seeks Interviews with Former Grumman Employees at Calverton

The U.S. Navy is requesting interviews with former employees, or their surviving family members, who worked at the Grumman-operated Naval Weapons Industrial Reserve Plant in Calverton between 1954 and 1996. These interviews will aid in the Navy's environmental remediation at the site, which covers approximately 6000 acres.

Since Grumman vacated the premises in 1996, the site has been a subject of controversy over chemical contamination, with dangerous chemicals such as perfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) and 1,4-dioxane that have leaked into the Peconic River and threaten the groundwater in the area.

The Navy said it is particularly interested in employees' knowledge of:

- Past operations and activities
- Waste management practices
- Building utilization
- Grounds maintenance
- Aircraft fabrication practices on site
- Any other relevant information, both on- and off-property.

Any former employee at Grumman's Calverton facility interested in participating in an interview or in learning more is asked to send an email to NAVFAC_ML_PAO_ALL@us.navy.mil or call 800-906-9339.

Participation in the interviews is completely voluntary and all information shared during the interviews will be kept confidential.

Free Discount Drug Program for Veterans

VeteranRx offers up to 80 percent off on brand-name and generic prescription drugs for veterans and their families. The program includes more than 35,000 pharmacies around the country, including all major chains. No medical service connection to the VA is necessary. There are no enrollment forms, no age or income requirements, no waiting periods, no eligibility requirements, no exclusions, covers pre-existing conditions, no claim forms to file, no annual or lifetime limits. This program has no service connection requirements. Ask your pharmacist to run both your insurance and the savings card and use the one that saves you the most money. Sometimes the free savings card will offer better prices than your insurance copay. Any veteran and family member of a U.S. Veteran with or without prescription coverage can use this free card. It even covers pet medications. Go to <https://www.veteranrx.com/> for more info.

Veteran Functions at Eisenhower Park

All veterans organizations that wish to hold an event, ceremony or other function at the park must contact the Nassau County Veterans Service Agency to get a permit. This requirement protects the organization as well as the park since the NCVSA holds an insurance policy covering any accidents or injuries that may occur during such events. Veterans Traffic Court (Nassau County)

The Nassau County Traffic and Parking Violations Agency (NCTPVA) at 801 Axinn Ave. in Garden City holds monthly traffic court sessions on the third Thursday afternoon of each month, dedicated to assisting veterans and active-duty military members with resolving violations. NCTPVA will work with the District Court to bundle all traffic violations together. This program is a one-time-only opportunity so don't waste it on minor violations.

Veterans Treatment Court (Nassau County)

U.S. military veterans charged with minor nonviolent offenses may qualify for reduced charges or penalties by participating in a court-supervised treatment program. To apply, a pre-screening questionnaire must be completed and forwarded to the district attorney's office. You must then contact the Veterans Treatment Court Project Director to set a clinical evaluation for the purpose of determining treatment needs. If you are found to be eligible, you will be contacted by the D.A.'s office and a plea offer will be proposed. Nassau County Veterans Service Agency Transportation Program

This program provides free transportation for scheduled VA medical appointments. The veteran will be picked up at his or her residence and driven in a Nassau County Veterans Service Agency vehicle to a designated VA facility.

Locations that are serviced for transportation are:

- VA Clinic, East Meadow
- VA Clinic, Valley Stream
- VA Vet Center, Hicksville
- VA Main Hospital, Northport

All appointments for transportation are required to be reserved two weeks prior to your scheduled VA appointment. Please call Jessica DeLisi (VSA Transportation Coordinator) at (516) 572-6526 to schedule transportation.

The Nassau County Veterans Service Agency is looking for volunteers to transport veterans to and from the aforementioned VA facilities. VetMart Food Pantry

Veterans may register at the food pantry for eligibility with a Veterans ID Card or DD Form 214 Military Discharge Form. *(Note: Other forms of veteran identification may be accepted, but eligibility will be at the discretion of the agency).* Once registered with the proper veteran documentation, the veteran may come to the food pantry once per week for food distributions; toiletries and other supplies are issued monthly. The Veterans Food Pantry is open Monday through Friday from 9:00 AM to 12:00 PM *(closed Weekends and Holidays)*. Nassau County Veterans Service Agency—Filing VA Claims

- Survivors Pension (DIC) Dependency Indemnity Compensation for the surviving spouse, child or parent of a service member who died in the line of duty or the survivor of a veteran who died from a service-related injury or illness.
- Aid & Attendance Benefit for qualified wartime-era veterans and their surviving spouses who require increased care due to disability or advanced age. Intended to help individuals cover the costs of in-home nursing care, assisted living or nursing home care.
- Burial benefits for eligible veterans to help cover burial, funeral and transportation costs.

Be the One App Now Available

For veterans in crisis, a new app for both Apple and Android devices offers guidance and community resources. The *Be the One* app was developed by Columbia University's Lighthouse Project and tailored to The American Legion's *Be the One* suicide prevention mission. It's available on both Apple's App Store and Google Play and uses the Columbia-Suicide Severity Rating Scale (C-SSRS), that gives anyone anywhere a simple series of questions to ask to determine if a veteran is at risk of suicide, and the severity and immediacy of that risk.

The app can be installed and run on the iPhone, the iPad and Android phones. One of the app's key features is privacy. Your name, address and phone number are not requested or recorded; only your ZIP code is disclosed so that local resources can be shown.

Schedule *Be the One* Training for Your Post for 2026

The American Legion has partnered with the Columbia University Lighthouse Project to bring in-person training as well as virtual training to Legion Family members. To schedule an in-person training session, email Wendy Lakso at wendy.lakso@nyspi.columbia.edu. She is the director of partnerships, and veteran and military initiatives for the Lighthouse Project.

The online 90-minute virtual training sessions will continue through 2026. They teach the Columbia Protocol that supports suicide risk assessment through a series of six simple questions. E-ZPass Disabled Veterans Non-Revenue Program

The New York State Thruway Authority offers free, unlimited travel anywhere on the Thruway to certain qualifying disabled veterans. A disabled veteran who obtains a fee-exempt vehicle registration from the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) may enroll in the Authority's Disabled Veteran Non-Revenue E-ZPass Program. Eligibility is *not* determined by percent disabled designations, specialty license plates or other similar criteria.

You must find out whether you are eligible for a fee-exempt registration before applying for the program by completing Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) [Form 21-4502](#) (automobile and adaptive equipment) and send to your assigned VA Regional Office, either in NYC or Buffalo. The VA will rate your claim, and if approved, you will be notified. Please call the Toll-Free VA number for questions about filling out Form 21-4502 at (800) 827-1000 (hearing-impaired TDD line (800) 829-4833).

The vehicle must be in the name of the disabled veteran applying for the program. Your Tag may be used if you need to travel in another vehicle, but you must be present in that vehicle, and the vehicle must be a passenger (2-axle, 4-tire) vehicle. Veterans who are approved for the program are asked to send in a renewal application and updated fee exempt registration every two years based on the expiration date of the fee-exempt registration.

If you travel on roadways and tolling facilities offering E-ZPass other than the NYS Thruway or outside of New York State, you must establish a revenue account by completing the [E-ZPass Application for Disabled Veteran Revenue Plan](#) (TA-W5080) in order to use your Tag. *(This revenue account form is only for disabled veterans who have been approved for the non-revenue program and would like to set up a revenue account in order to travel outside of the NYS Thruway system.)*

Did you know . . .

. . . that, during World War II, B-17 ball turret gunner Alan E. Magee survived falling from 22,000 feet—without a parachute.

Shortly after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Magee, then days away from turning 23, enlisted in the Army Air Forces on January 7, 1942. He applied to be a pilot but was passed over. Instead, he was trained as a ball turret gunner since his height (5'6") and weight (155 lb.) meant he would be a perfect fit for the turret, an important but vulnerable position that sat beneath the belly of the B-17, exposed to fighters and flak, with nowhere to run.

Magee was assigned to the 303rd Bomb Group, 360th Bomb Squadron, which flew B-17 Flying Fortresses out of Molesworth Airfield in England. On January 3, 1943, Staff Sergeant Magee flew his seventh mission aboard a B-17 nick-named *Snap! Crackle! Pop!*, whose target was the strategic German U-boat pens at Saint-Nazaire, France. This mission was especially hazardous since it was a daylight raid on a heavily-defended area known to bomber crews as "Flak City."

As the bomber group neared the target, German flak batteries opened up, filling the skies with dangerous shrapnel. Magee's ball turret was hit, rendering it inoperable. Amazingly, he was uninjured,

but his parachute was shredded. Magee left the turret and was heading to the radio room when another flak strike took off part of the bomber's right wing, putting the bomber into a violent spin. In the chaos, Magee was knocked unconscious and thrown out of the aircraft at an estimated speed of 120 mph and at an estimated height of 22,000 feet—a bit over four miles.

Fortunately for Magee, he did not hit the ground directly, which would have been instantly fatal but instead crashed through the glass roof of the Saint-Nazaire railroad station. The structure absorbed much of the impact, but Magee was severely injured with 28 shrapnel wounds, a broken nose, a damaged left eye, a punctured lung, kidney damage, a fractured right leg and a right arm that was nearly severed. German civilians and soldiers pulled his body from the wreckage. Many assumed he was already dead. He was not. He regained consciousness at a first aid station before transport to the hospital.

The German doctor who treated him told Magee, “We are enemies, but I am first a doctor, and I will do my best to save your arm.” And he did. Magee never learned the doctor's name, but he did recover from his wounds and was later transferred to Stalag Luft 17B at Braunau-Gneikendorf, near Krems an der Donau, Austria, along with two other survivors, where they spent the rest of the war as POWs.

Magee was liberated in May 1945 and received the Air Medal for meritorious conduct and a Purple Heart. He went on to earn his pilot's license, got married and worked in the aviation industry in a variety of roles. On January 3, 1993, the 50th anniversary of the attack, the people of St. Nazaire honored Magee and the crew of his bomber by erecting a 6-foot-tall (1.8 m) memorial to them. He died at the age of 84 in San Angelo, Texas, on December 20, 2003, from stroke and kidney failure.

Dorothy Oxendine of Farmingdale passed away on November 9 at age 99 of undisclosed causes. Dorothy lost her son, Marine Paratrooper PFC Willie French "Frenchie" Oxendine III, while he was assigned to I Company, 3rd Battalion, 26th Marines, 3rd Marine Division, III MAF, during the Vietnam War on May 30, 1968 (Memorial Day); he was only 19. She also lost a daughter, Lois, in 2014.

Her grief propelled her to join the American Gold Star Mothers and she soon became a prominent member within the organization, eventually serving as its National President from 2002 to 2003. She was also a member of the Long Island National Cemetery Memorial Organization (LINCMO), becoming its first (and so far, only) female president in 2008. In 2003, driven by a need for closure and remembrance, she journeyed to Vietnam to visit the site where her son had been killed.

She was interred at Long Island National Cemetery in Farmingdale and is survived by her daughter, Barbara Ezzo; her sister, Delores; her six grandchildren, 11 great-grandchildren and three great-great-grandchildren.

Francisco Muñiz III of Westbury passed away on December 23 at the age of 84 of undisclosed causes.

Francisco was an Army Vietnam combat veteran who served as a Light Weapons Infantryman; he was in for six years (1964-1970), attaining the rank of Specialist Fourth Class.

Francisco joined Chapter 82 of the Vietnam Veterans Association (VVA) in 1980, serving in a variety of officer and board positions over the years. Since 2005, he served as secretary of the Vietnam Veterans of America New York State Council. He was a founding member of the Veterans Health Alliance of Long Island, a coalition of agencies that provide outreach, advocacy and training to veterans and their families. He also served as a peer facilitator for the Nassau County PFC Dwyer Project, providing Vet2Vet Peer Support to veterans of all generations, and as president of the New York Vietnam Veterans Foundation.

He is survived by his children Jose, Anna, Carmen and Francisco, and his six grandchildren.

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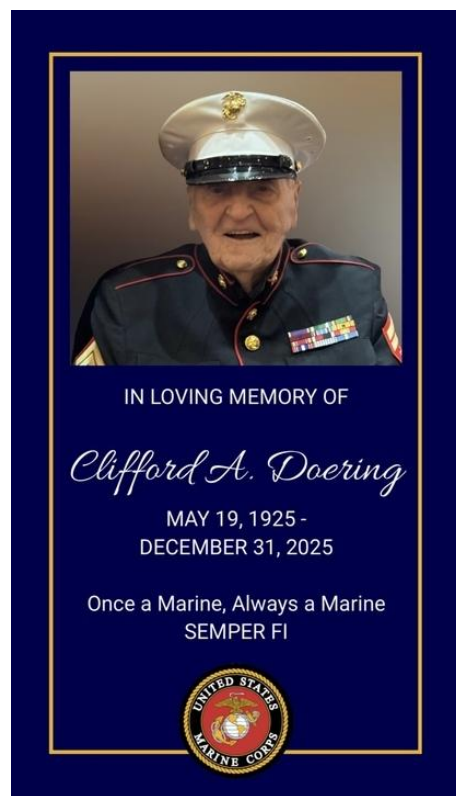

Clifford “Cliff” A. Doering of Hicksville passed away at the Long Island State Veterans Home on December 31 at the age of 100 of undisclosed causes. He joined the Marines at the age of 18 and saw combat in one of the bloodiest and final battles of World War II, the Battle of Okinawa. After the war, he was selected to serve in the Presidential Honor Guard under President Harry Truman. He was on reserve for the Korean War and separated with the rank of corporal.

Clifford retired after almost 50 years with the A&P Company but continued to work part-time jobs and do volunteer work well into his 80s. He was an active member of the Plainview American Legion, the Hicksville VFW and the Sunrise Detachment of the Marine Corps League. He was recognized multiple times by Nassau County for the countless hours he spent chauffeuring disabled veterans to their medical appointments at the Northport VA. He said it helped him to feel grateful for his own life and health to assist vets who were sick, disabled or amputees.
